Let the Children Come to Me

Playgrounds provide a place for children and families to come together. While kids build their physical and social skills, their adults forge relationships. With funding help from the Small Church Ministry, two congregations revitalized their church playgrounds, creating welcome spaces for the community to reconnect after the distance caused by COVID-19.

In late 2018, the session of Bott Memorial Church in Dinwiddie County began looking critically at their 15-year-old playground. Congregation members and neighbors value the space at the church since the next closest playground is five miles away at the elementary school.

At the same time, C.J. Gomez, a youth elder at Bott Memorial and a Boy Scout, approached Pastor Katherine Jackson about completing a service project at the church. An overhaul of the play area was a perfect fit, with Gomez leading the planning and fundraising for the initiative.

Forty miles north in Chesterfield County, Ampthill Church is tucked in a residential area. The backyard of the church property has for many years been dedicated to a neighborhood playground, beloved by members and non-members.

In early 2021, the Ampthill Presbyterian Women decided the aging play structure needed an update for safety. They solicited contributions from family and friends and a grant from Costco, raising \$9,000.

As both churches have small congregations—Ampthill has about 75 members and Bott, 58—they were eligible to apply for grants from

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Worshiping Community Becomes a Church

Trinity Ghanaian Presbyterian Fellowship has organized as Holy Trinity Presbyterian Church, after 12 years as a worshiping community. The process was approved October 16 at the 109th presbytery meeting, with some of the church's 40 members participating.

“We thank the leadership of the presbytery for their guidance, mentorship, and support in getting us this far,” shared congregation member Kwame Appiah-Yeboah, who presented the petition for organization to the presbytery. “We are ready and willing to partner to further the Lord's work in Richmond.”

Holy Trinity Church began in October 2009, serving African families who emigrated to Richmond. It became part of the PC(USA)'s 1001 New Worshiping Communities initiative, which raises up leaders in churches and presbyteries inspired by God to create new congregations, particularly those reflecting new and varied forms of church for our changing culture. Participation includes financial support and coaching to help the new groups succeed and grow.

For building space, the fellowship partners with other congregations in the presbytery, currently Tuckahoe Church and previously Three Chopt Church. Rev. Dr. Willie Woodson, who had retired from First United Church after 26 years, became the fellowship's pastor. It was a dream of Woodson and the Trinity Ghanaian Fellowship family to eventually organize as a church.

In 2019, the Presbyterian Mission Agency awarded Trinity Ghanaian Fellowship a \$25,000 grant to promote its growth and development.

STATED MEETING: October 16, 2021**Jordanger Installed as Moderator, Three Candidates Approved for Ordination at 109th Meeting**

The 109th stated meeting of the Presbytery of the James was held virtually on October 16, 2021. Westminster Church, Richmond, and Ginter Park Church served as host sites for presbytery leaders.

John Garrett, a ruling elder at St. James Church and a former presbytery moderator, led a service of installation for Dan Jordanger (Providence Church, Gum

Spring) as moderator through February 2023. The installation of Jordanger, previously vice-moderator, came early due to the relocation of Rev. Patrick Dennis and family to Texas. We are grateful for the service of Patrick and Sarah Dennis during their time here.

Rev. Shannon Waite Hendricks, covenant pastor at Fairfield Church, and Rev. Hyung "Howard" Kim, pastor of Lord Jesus Korean Church, led the presbytery in worship. Rev. Kim preached a message entitled "Are You Good Soil?" based on Matthew 13:1-9.

During worship, we celebrated the sacrament of the Lord's Supper and recognized ministers and ruling elders who had entered the Church Triumphant in the prior year.

Rev. Karen Witt, pastor of Providence Church, Gum Spring, and moderator of the Examinations Committee, welcomed five new ministers to the presbytery:

Three candidates for ministry of the Word and Sacrament participated in the final step of the examination process:

- Colleen Earp (Ginter Park Church) to serve as director of Programs at Massanetta Springs Camp and Conference Center
- Patrick Lane (Presbytery of St. Andrew) to be pastor of Mitchells Church
- Crystal Varner Parker (Three Chopt Church) to be associate pastor of Salisbury Church

Each was approved for ordination. In addition, Ruling Elder Marvin Daniel (Second Church, Richmond) was commissioned as a commissioned pastor for mission and advocacy at Second Richmond. May God's love and blessing be upon them as they enter the ministry.

The business of the day was comprised of the following:

- Declared the constitution and organization of the Holy Trinity Presbyterian Church (formerly Trinity

Ghanaian Fellowship) as a congregation of the presbytery.

- Received the 2022 proposed budget as a first reading.
- Elected Rev. Fred Holbrook as stated clerk effective December 1 for a period of one year or until the election of a successor stated clerk.
- Approved an updated Manual of Administrative Operations.
- Elected a number of people to serve on presbytery constitutional committees, commissions, committees, and teams, including commissioners for the 225th General Assembly (2022) of the PC(USA).
- Heard a progress report from Ruling Elder Barbara Flynt (Brandermill Church), co-moderator of the Presbyters Search Committee.
- Granted honorable retirement to Rev. Victoria Murdock effective May 31, 2021; Rev. Beverly Sherrill Bullock effective December 31, 2021; and Rev. Sylvester Bullock effective December 31, 2021.
- Disapproved a continuing education policy proposed by the Commission on Ministry.

Moderator Jordanger declared the meeting adjourned at 1:20 p.m. and led the presbytery in prayer.

Campbell Presbyterian and Living Water Lutheran Share Faith and Space

Two congregations from different denominations now have one address in the Northern Neck of Virginia. Campbell Memorial Presbyterian Church and Living Water Lutheran Church have begun a partnership that allows the Lutheran congregation to use space in and operate from the Presbyterian facility.

The Lutheran congregation is part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Because of the two denominations' similar theology and practices, since 1997 ELCA and PC(USA) have been in "full communion." This allows them to worship together and exchange clergy.

About two years ago, the cost of maintaining their large building prompted

the Lutherans to begin exploring other options. About that time, the Rev. Jim Moseley, then the new pastor at Campbell, recognized that there was considerable unused space at his church.

"Ecumenical interactions can be richly rewarding," Moseley says. "And this could be a 'win-win' situation for these two churches."

After consultation with congregational leaders at Campbell, who agreed with the idea, he invited Living Water to consider renting space in Weems.

Living Water's leaders found that Campbell "checked nearly all the boxes" for their needs.

"From the beginning, in so many ways, I have felt that the Holy Spirit is at work in this partnering," states the Rev. Bruce Burslie, lead pastor at Living Water.

"The agreement allows Living Water and Campbell to continue being unique, independent congregations, while at the same time sharing activities in Christian education, mission, and service," comments the Rev. Judy Thomson, a PC(USA)-ordained minister serving as co-pastor at Living Water.

Kirk O'Cliff Church Celebrates 145 Years of Ministry



On October 17, current and former congregants gathered to celebrate Kirk O'Cliff Church's 145th anniversary. Bobby Goodwin, who has worshiped at the Kirk for 70 years, recalled the church's history and his childhood memories. Other members led the congregation in the Lord's Prayer using American Sign Language.

The church building was constructed in 1876 of hand-made bricks because there was no suitable lumber nearby. Between 1910 and 1911, the sanctuary was dismantled and rebuilt using the original materials in a new location.

Presbyterians Help Afghan Refugees in Virginia

In July and August, following the takeover of Afghanistan by the Taliban, more than 124,000 Afghan refugees were evacuated to the United States. Through Operation Allies Refuge, the U.S. military is coordinating care until the refugees can be resettled into more permanent accommodations.

Government agencies, non-profit organizations, and faith communities also are coming to the aid of these displaced people. Your church may be one of those helping “the least of these”.

New Hanover Church coordinated a drive for blankets. On September 22, they delivered nearly 700 twin, full, and baby-sized blankets to Marine Corps Base Quantico in Prince William County. Quantico is housing up to 5,000 Afghans.

Genito Church in Powhatan County focused on the needs of refugee children, collecting clothes, diapers, and wipes. The items were provided to Fort Pickett in Nottoway County, which has more than 7,000 evacuees. Fort Lee in Prince George County also is housing Afghans.

Once they leave military bases, some Afghans will go to Massanetta Springs Camp and Conference Center in Harrisonburg which, through a partnership

with Church World Service, has provided short-term housing for refugees in the past. Your congregation can support Massanetta through donations to fund meals and housing space. Other ways to assist include serving meals and donating hygiene, cleaning, kitchen, and clothing items.

The International Rescue Committee (IRC) offers additional ways to help Afghans in Virginia. These include donating funds and in-kind items to the Charlottesville or Richmond IRC offices, sponsoring a family, and volunteering.

Monthly Saturday Program Fills VBS Void at Culpeper Church

After several years without vacation Bible school, the Christian education committee at Culpeper Church decided to re-evaluate the traditional weeklong event and launched something new for 2021. Once a month, the church holds Sunrise Saturdays, a morning program with music, Bible stories, activities, and games.

Each month has a different theme. In June, two puzzle rooms explored the stories of Joseph and Paul and Silas. For July’s “Build It” theme, children learned about Solomon’s temple and constructed birdhouses. In August, they painted rocks and distributed them downtown. September featured a scavenger hunt, with 12 actors portraying disciples for participants to discover.

Between 10 and 20 volunteers are involved each month, including members of the youth group who illustrate Bible stories through skits.


“The monthly format has been easy to staff with volunteers,” said Katherine Ayers, a member of the Christian education committee.


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In December 2020, Woodson passed away suddenly. To commemorate and honor Woodson's leadership, members of the church began the process of organizing.
